PRIVATE PARTS IN PUBLIC SPACES

Richard Dailey has illustrated in photographic closeups a chapter from the repertory of antique sculpture by cataloguing the gods and goddesses, the heroes and heroines of antiquity, wreathed in their aura of beauty and truth. The images are presented traditionally in familiar album form: photo albums, nature studies, practical illustrated manuals, museum catalogues. Curiously, the effect of these close-ups contradicts the traditional perception of classical sculpture; their individuality, enhanced by the ages, emerges here from the lineaments of classical expression.

These metonymic details also suggest an archeological approach to the subject at hand. As the legends imply, these fragments invite us to examine each detail, place it in its original context, date it, name it, return it to its body.

The legends also take us beyond the sphere of the merely intimate and into the public galleries of the museum. The visual pleasure of these images is heightened to include the pleasures of aesthetic and historical research. Furthermore, these intimate details of antiquity framed by the photographic lens reflect our current cultural obsessions, from our interest in the body and its representations to the overabundance of images and their implications.

Thanks to Richard Dailey and his unique contribution to the History of Art, antique sculpture will never be the same.




















